16. Specific lobbying issues

H.R. 11 (Bilbray), a bill to amend the Clean Air Act to permit the exclusive application of California State regulations regarding reformulated gas in certain areas within the State; all provisions.

H.R. 1367 (Franks), to amend section 211 of the Clean Air Act to prohibit the use of the fuel additive MTBE in gasoline; all provisions.

H.R. 1398 (Pombo), to amend section 211 of the Clean Air Act to prohibit the use of certain fuel additives; all provisions.

H.R. 1705 (Pallone), to amend the Clean Air Act to waive the oxygen content requirement for reformulated gasoline and to phase-out the use of MTBE, and for other purposes; all provisions.

H.R. 3449 (Greenwood), to amend the Clean Air Act to provide for a State waiver of the requirements concerning the oxygen content of gasoline; all provisions.

H.R. 3798 (Forbes), to amend section 211 of the Clean Air Act to prohibit the use of MTBE as a fuel additive, to amend the Solid Waste Disposal Act to accelerate the cleanup of MTBE released from leaking underground storage tanks, and to amend the Safe Drinking Water Act to assist communities with MTBE contamination in drinking water supplies, and for other purposes; all provisions.

H.R. 4011 (Ganske), to amend section 211 of the Clean Air Act to prohibit the use of MTBE, to provide flexibility within the oxygenate requirement of the Environmental Protection Agency's Reformulated Gasoline Program, to promote the use of renewable ethanol, and for other purposes; all provisions.

H.R. 4303 (Ewing), to prohibit the use of, and provide for remediation of water contaminated by, methyl tertiary butyl ether; all provisions.

S. 645 (Feinstein), a bill to amend the Clean Air Act to waive the oxygen requirement for reformulated gasoline that results in no greater emissions of air pollutants than reformulated gasoline meeting the oxygen content requirement; all provisions.

S. 1037 (Boxer), a bill to amend the Toxic Substances Control Act to provide for a gradual reduction in the use of methyl tertiary butyl ether, and for other purposes; all provisions.

S. 1886 (Inhofe), a bill to permit the Governor of a State to waive the oxygen requirement for reformulated gasoline, to encourage the development of voluntary standards to prevent and control releases of methyl tertiary butyl ether from underground storage tanks, and for other purposes; all provisions.

S. 2233 (Fitzgerald) a bill to prohibit the use of, and provide for remediation of water contaminated by, methyl tertiary butyl ether; all provisions.

S. 2503 (Daschle) a bill to amend the Clean Air Act to authorize States to regulate harmful fuel additives and to require fuel to contain fuel made from renewable sources, to amend the Solid Waste Disposal Act to require that at least 85 percent of funds appropriated to the Environmental Protection Agency from the Leaking Underground Storage Tank Trust Fund be distributed to States to carry out cooperative agreements for undertaking corrective action and for enforcement of subtitle I of that Act, and for other purposes; all provisions.

S. 2546 (Bond), a bill to amend the Clean Air Act to prohibit the use of methyl tertiary butyl ether, to provide flexibility within the oxygenate requirement of the reformulated gasoline program of the Environmental Protection Agency, to promote the use of renewable ethanol, and for other purposes; all provisions.

S. 2723 (Inhofe), to amend the Clean Air Act to permit the Governor of a State to waive the oxygen content requirement for reformulated gasoline, to encourage development of voluntary standards to prevent and control releases of methyl tertiary butyl ether from underground storage tanks, to establish a program to phase out the use of methyl tertiary butyl ether, and for other purposes; all provisions.

S. 2962 (Smith), to amend the Clean Air Act to address problems concerning methyl tertiary butyl ether, and for other purposes; all provisions.

S. 2971 (Harkin), to amend the Clean Air Act to phase out the use of methyl tertiary butyl ether in fuels or fuel additives, to promote the use of renewable fuels, and for other purposes; all provisions.
