S.2766, Departments of Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2003:supported and advocated for passage of the following items:supported the Ad Hoc Group for Medical Research Funding recommendation for an FY2003 appropriation of \$27.3 billion for the National Institutes of Health, as the final step of the five-year effort to double the NIH budget;supported advocacy effort of AAU for increased funding(\$300 million) for extramural facilities construction through the National Institutes of Health National Center for Research Resources(NCRR); supported advocacy effort of the AAMC to retain the provision from FY'02 funding bill that maintained the salary cap imposed on extramural National Institutes of Health researchers at Level 1 of the Executive pay scale which equals \$166,700 in last year's bill;Requested funding support for the "Center for Community-Based Health Promotion and Training" sponsored by the Johns Hopkins Urban Health Institute.Center would include partnership with Georgetown University Law Center and Morgan State University and amount requested of Senate is \$3 million over three years;Monitored for continued funding for the Johns Hopkins Center for Civilian Biodefense Strategies in FY2003 Labor, HHS and Education appropriations bill;S.2797,Departments of Veterans Affairs and Housing and Urban Development, and Independent Agencies Appropriations Act,2003:supported and advocated passage for the following:Increase funding for Fiscal Year 2003 for the National Space Biomedical Research Institute. Sought a total of \$25.5 million which would be an increase of \$8.5 million over President's budget request;S.2784, Energy and Water Development Appropriations Act,2003:advocated for support of an appropriation of \$3.5 billion in FY 2003 to support funding for DOE's Office of Science programs.This would be a 9.3 percent increase over last year's level for this Office;S.2797,Departments of Veterans Affairs and Housing and Urban Development, and Independent Agencies Appropriations Act,2003:advocated for doubling the NSF budget in five years;advocated promoting the expansion of NSF funding in areas such as nanotechnology and information technology and support for development of Nanotechnology Consortium in Maryland in collaboration with other institutions;advocated for continued support from EPA for the Center for Urban Asthma Studies;advocated for increased funding levels for NASA appropriations;advocated support for NASA's "Living with a Star" program and the Mars Exploration Program that also includes a strong competitive science component to investigate the surface of Mars;advocated Pluto-Kuiper Belt Mission in which a unique opportunity exists to send a planetary explorer to Pluto and the Kuiper Belt. Congress is encouraged to continue the New Horizons mission as part of the New Frontiers Program.

Advocated for the continuation of funding of the following two grants: The Center for the Social Organization of Schools at Johns Hopkins University has received a five-year term grant for Education of Students Placed at Risk. This funding is critical to the work that Johns Hopkins is doing in several at risk schools; The Center for the Social Organization of Schools also has developed several successful models such as Success for All and the National Network of Partnership Schools using grant funds from DOE; advocated for an FY2003 funding level for NEH at \$150 million. This would be a \$25 million or 20 percent increase over the FY2002 level of \$125 million. The Eisenhower Library is seeking funding from the NEH for a grant, Save America's Treasures, of \$300-\$400K to refurbish the George Peabody Library; supports the Association of American University institutions by advocating for increased funding levels for student aid programs: SEOG program, Perkins Loan, Pell grant, Federal Work-Study, LEAP, and TRIO, Direct Student Loan Program; supports the Association of American University institutions by advocating a \$40 million appropriation for the Graduate Assistance in Areas of National Need (GAANN) and \$13 million appropriation for the Jacob K. Javits graduate education programs in the Department of Education. Began working with ACE, NAICU, and AAU to establish the university community positions on the Reauthorization of the Higher Education Act. This reauthorization is scheduled to take place in 2003.

The following language was included: Section 1305. For purpose of facilitating the sale of Stafford Apartments (FHA Project No:052-44163) for use as student housing. Subsections 1,2,3,4 and 5 were included. Met with Senator Mikulski to pursue funding for the demolition and relocation of housing surrounding the Johns Hopkins Hospital. Options explored were HUD and Transportation. No funding received in this time frame.
