



**16. Specific lobbying issues**

1. **Oppose** the Nomination of John Ashcroft for the position of U.S. Attorney General.
2. **Support** the "End Racial Profiling Act of 2001" (S.989/H.R. 1343) which would ban the use of racial profiling, provide funding for studies and establish a system of accountability for officers using the practice.
3. **Support** the "Employment Non-Discrimination Act of 2001" (S.1284/H.R. 2692) the bill would prohibit discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation, providing basic protection to ensure fairness in the workplace for Americans who are currently denied equal protection under the law.
4. **Support** (S. 1311), "Refugee Protection Act of 2001", a bill to limit the use of expedited removal proceedings and immigration detection on refugees who are fleeing persecution or torture.
5. **Support** the "Equal Protection of Voting Rights of 2001" (S.565/H.R. 1170), an election reform bill that would address many of the problems exposed during the past election by improving education and accessibility.
6. **Support** for the Hate Crimes Prevention Act, named "Local Law Enforcement Enhancement Act", (S.625/H.R. 1343) which would expand existing federal hate crime laws.
7. **Oppose** the "Community Solutions Act of 2001" (H.R.7), specifically the charitable choice provisions. Among other concerns, the bill would permit religious organizations to deliver federally-funded social services without having to comply with relevant federal anti-discrimination laws.
8. **Oppose** the "Boy Scouts of America Equal Access Act," an amendment to the Elementary and Secondary Education Act that would eliminate federal funding for schools that do not allow the BSA to use their facilities because of their policy forbidding employment and membership for gay males.
9. **Support** (S. 1452), "Family Reunification Act of 2001". A bill to permit certain long-term permanent resident aliens to seek cancellation of removal.



Continue lobbying issues

10. LCCR strongly **supported** H.R. 87, "Keeping Families Together Act of 2000." A bill restore certain provisions relating to the definition of aggravated felony and other provisions of immigration law to their status before the enactment of the Illegal Immigration Reform and Immigrant Responsibility Act of 1996.
11. **Support** S.955, "Immigrant Fairness Restoration Act of 2001", to modify immigration law restrictions added by the Illegal Immigration Reform and Immigrant Responsibility Act of 1996.
12. **Support** "Unaccompanied Alien Child Protection Act of 2001", S. 121, to establish an office of children's services within the Department of Justice to coordinate and implement government actions involving unaccompanied alien children.
13. **Support** full funding for the Technology Opportunities Program (TOP), a competitive grant program that brings the benefits of innovative digital network technologies to underserved communities across the United States.
14. **Support** the "Preservation of Civil Rights Protections Act of 2001" (H.R.2292) which would restore the right of workers to sue an employer in federal and state court for violations of anti-discrimination laws in cases involving binding arbitration agreement
15. Support funding for the anti-bias and hate crimes prevention programs retained in the "Better Education for Students and Teachers Act" (S.1) and oppose any efforts that would eliminate this existing authority for the Department of Education to develop and support anti-bias and hate crimes prevention programs in the reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA).
