

"I'm trying to get Congress to pass a bill which will give tax incentives, tax credits and loan guarantees to people to invest in the...poor areas of America, just like they get today to invest in poor areas around the world. I think that it's a good thing that we encourage people to invest in Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean, but they ought to have the same incentives to invest in the Mississippi Delta and Appalochia and the Native American reservations and the inner cities..." President Wm. J. Clinton, July 6, 1999

Congress... Let's get priorities straight.

Before providing millions in tax/tariff concessions to companies importing clothing from Sub-Saharan Africa or the Caribbean, let's consider helping U.S. companies actually producing garments with American workers in America. H.R. 434, "African Growth and Opportunity Act," and H.R. 984, "Caribbean and Central America Relief and Economic Stabilization Act," do nothing for domestic production.

- ◆ No tax concessions or tax holidays for companies staying in the U.S. to equal the lures offered by countries fishing for our companies.
- ◆ No training incentives for job creation in the U.S.
- ◆ No duty or quota free access to raw materials like yarn (as these bills would give to imported garments).
- ◆ No assistance for product development to aid innovation.
- ◆ No special depreciation allowances for new equipment.

In short, these bills do nothing for those providing domestic jobs and everything for those importing what could be made here.

Apparel and related sewn products and textiles have lost more than 137,000 jobs in the twelve months ending May '99; textiles lost 46,000. Since NAFTA these industries have lost 414,000 jobs. America's poorest communities have been hardest hit, and these bills will hit them again. It is time to stop the self-inflicted bloodletting and focus on job creation at home.

H.R. 984 and H.R. 434, S. 371 and/or the Chairman's Mark thereon should be returned to Committee for a total overhaul which helps domestic production and American workers first.
