Tax Policies to Promote Saving and Investment. During the first half of 2004, ACCF lobbyists were in contact with various covered officials in Congress and the Administration to advocate legislation to reform the estate tax, measures to enhance pension saving vehicles, and legislation to improve the taxation of repatriated earnings of U.S. foreign subsidiaries. These initiatives would promote capital formation, economic growth and job creation. ACCF lobbying efforts included briefing covered officials in Congress and the Administration on estate tax reform through the CAPTAX (an ACCF proposal), pension reform legislation, and reform international tax laws. ACCF also provided background material on the economic impact of these issues.
