16. Specific Lobbying Activities

Medicare Modernization Act (MMA) Regulations (Public Law 108-173); Section 231, Medicare Advantage Plans for Special Needs Individuals (42 CFR, Parts 417, 422, 423)

Worked with the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services on drafting regulations govern the Medicare Modernization Act (Public Law 108-173), with a special focus on Section 231 relating to Medicare Advantage Special Needs Plans (SNPs) for Special Needs Individuals. Developed recommendations in relation to the Draft Interim Regulations regarding SNPs, wi special focus on:

- Definitions of special needs plans that disproportionately serve special needs beneficiaries
- Definitions of special needs individuals with severe or disabling chronic conditions a of institutionalized beneficiaries;
- Bidding procedures for demonstrations serving high-risk beneficiaries;
- Rules pertaining to standard MA plans or demos transitioning to SNP status;
- Recommendations for enhancing payment for SNPs and refining performance evalua methods and quality indicators to better account for plan performance in relation to the unique needs of high-risk individuals.

Also corresponded with CMS to encourage authority for one final extension of Social HMO waiver authority through 2007, consistent with the phase-in period for the new MA risk adju payment system. Also corresponded and met with CMS staff to discuss the potential of Soci HMO demonstrations to expand into new service areas under their demo benefit package du the transition period of 2005-2008 before the Medicare risk adjustment system is fully implemented and Social HMO waivers expire.

Also discussed the potential for Medicaid reform with selected Congressional staff to encour attention to the need for better coordination between the Medicare and Medicaid programs for dually eligible beneficiaries.
